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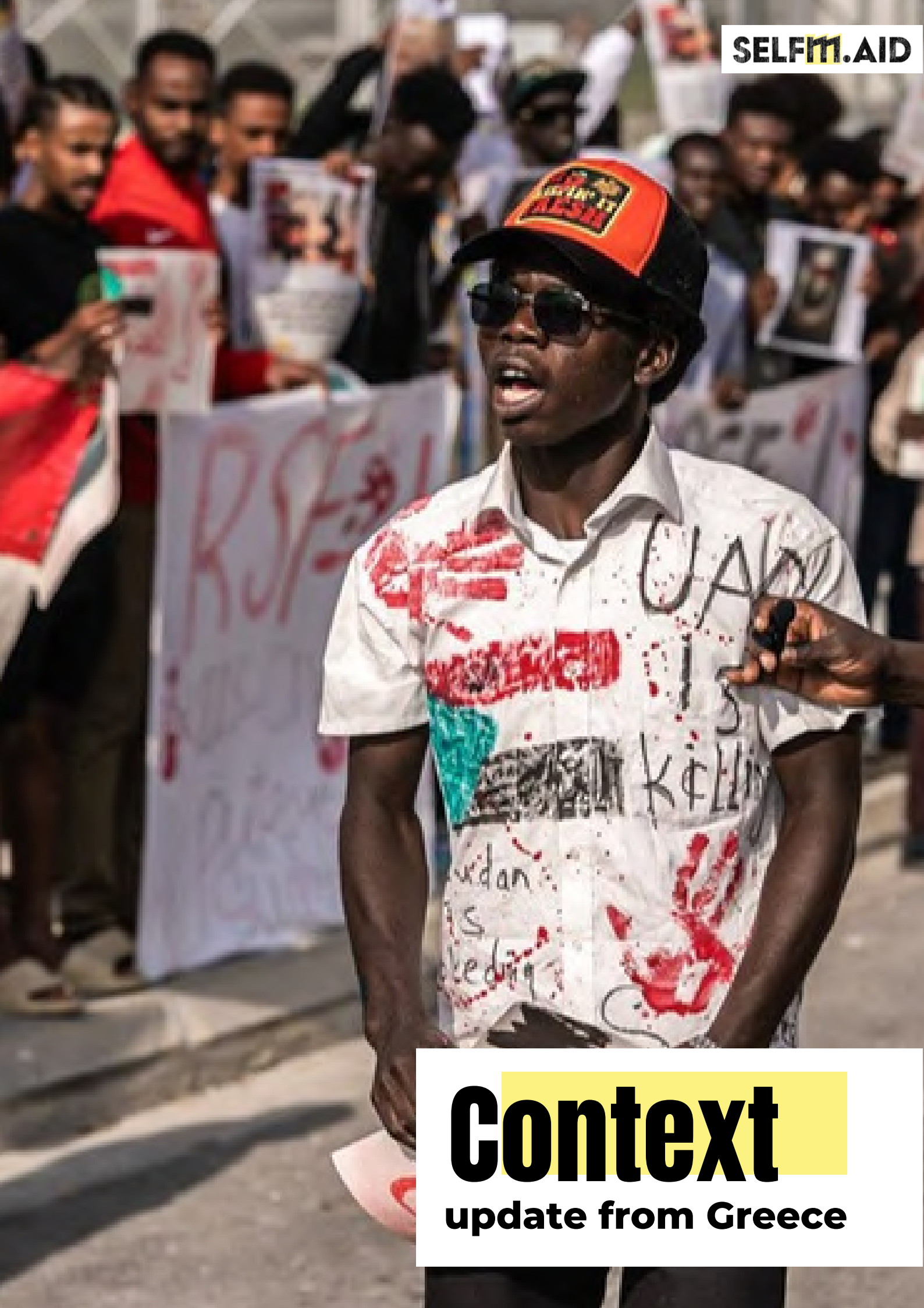
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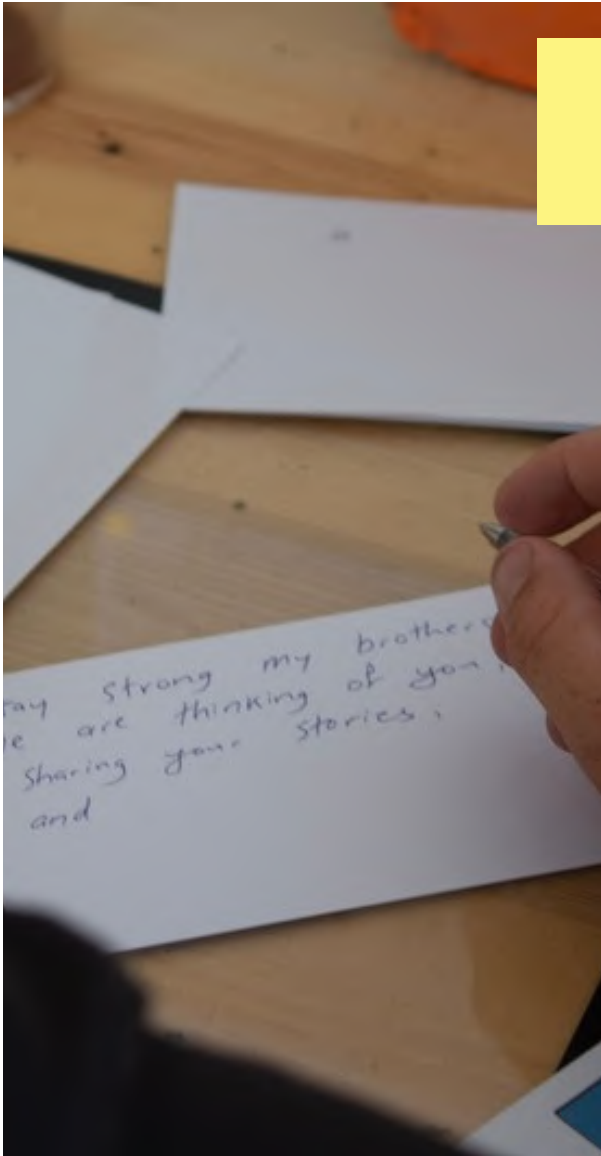

PACT ON ASYLUM AND MIGRATION

WHAT IS IT AND HOW WILL IT AFFECT SAMOS?

As of June 12th, the [Pact on Asylum and Migration](#) became fully applicable. The Pact is a set of 10 pieces of binding legislation that overhauls how the EU manages its borders. The new rules **undermine the right to asylum** by making it easier for governments to rush protection claim assessments, increases the duration of detention for asylum seekers and limits safeguarding.

The true impact of the Pact will not be fully known until it's roll out is complete. However, a clear example of the Pact's future trajectory throughout Europe is here in Samos. The Samos CCAC - with it's harmful, prison-like facilities - will become the new norm, being used as a blueprint by law makers when developing the [Border Procedure legislation](#) which will allow for nearly indiscriminate detention.

Here on Samos, the first noticeable change was the temporary suspension of the registration system for CCAC residents who had arrived after June 12th due to a reported fault in the integration of the new screening system. This lasted around a month, with residents being de facto detained in the CCAC, unable to exit without their registration cards.

We are **deeply concerned** about the implementation of the Pact and how it will further **border violence, detention** and **pushbacks**.

'SMUGGLING' TRIALS IN THE SAMOS COURT

THE CRIMINALISATION OF REFUGEES

The distressing trend of scapegoating asylum seekers who touch a boat engine or hold a tiller by the Greek authorities and **prosecuting them as smugglers** sadly continues here on Samos.

On June 22nd and June 24th, the [Human Rights Legal Project](#) defended 6 asylum seekers accused of smuggling charges. 4 out of 6 clients were acquitted of all charges (Chad, DRC, Sudan, Kurd), 1 will be released from detention (Syrian) and 1 was found guilty (Palestinian). The defence team applied the Article 3 Exemption clause that asylum seekers should be exempt from punishment for "facilitating illegal entry" when they are seeking international protection. However, the **reality of judicial practice** shows us that this clause is often not applied.

Their fight for justice continues: **no person should be criminalised while seeking safety.**

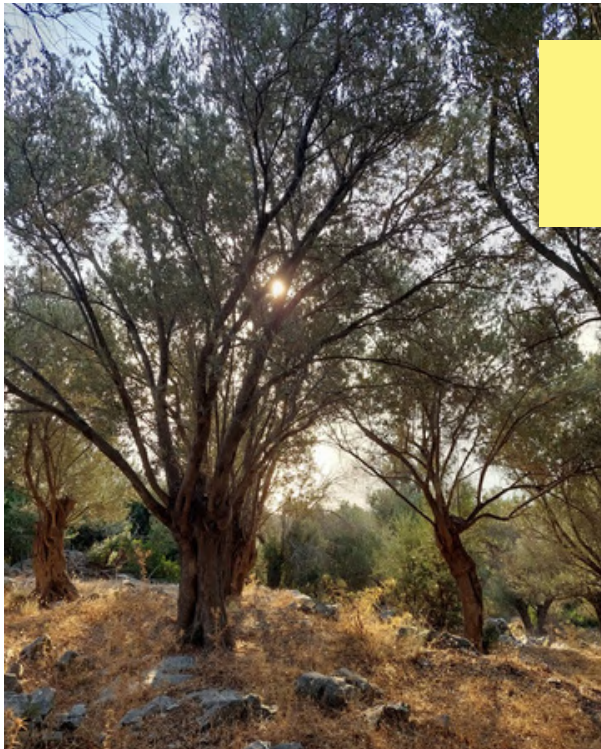
AN OPEN LETTER TO SAMOS CCAC

7 Samos NGOs, including selfm.aid, have written and delivered an [open letter](#) to the relevant authorities addressing grave violations of the rights of residents of the Samos CCAC. The vast majority visitors, community volunteers and students of the selfm.aid projects either have lived or currently live in the Samos CCAC.

- **Continued refusal to vaccinate children and newborn babies:** A number of babies born in Samos were not vaccinated within sufficient time periods, with many still waiting, despite repeated requests made by their parents and Human Rights Legal Project.
- **Barriers to the exit of the CCAC for single parents with minor children:** Single parents with minor children are prohibited from exiting the CCAC without their children. Children cannot be left in the care of another trusted adult and there is no form of childcare in the CCAC.
- **Denial of food and water to residents with special reception needs:** Some families who have stayed more than 30 days in the CCAC have been reported as only receiving food if there are leftovers from the daily food distributions. Among those affected are young children, pregnant women and people with serious illnesses.



We wish to **denounce** the ongoing **serious violations** of the rights of asylum seekers and beneficiaries of international protection within the Samos Closed Controlled Access Centre (CCAC). The conditions of living in the Samos CCAC fall below minimum standards of **human dignity** required under international and European reception obligations.



BURIAL OF PUSHBACK VICTIM DELAYED BY 3 YEARS

DONATE TODAY TO ASSIST IN HER DIGNIFIED BURIAL

In 2023, a woman died during a deadly pushback off the coast of Samos. With great effort, the [Human Rights Legal Project](#) (HRLP) located her daughter and were assured that the Municipality of Samos would complete the burial. However, 3 years later they have discovered that the woman had remained unburied.

HRLP have now secured burial space for her and 2 other people who have lost their lives at sea, however have been told they must cover the costs themselves and we urge all those who can, to [donate](#).

The **victims of border violence** deserve at the very least, a respectful burial and we condemn the Municipality of Samos for their lack of respect for human dignity after death.

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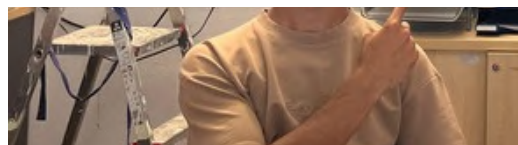
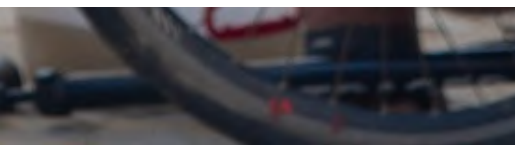

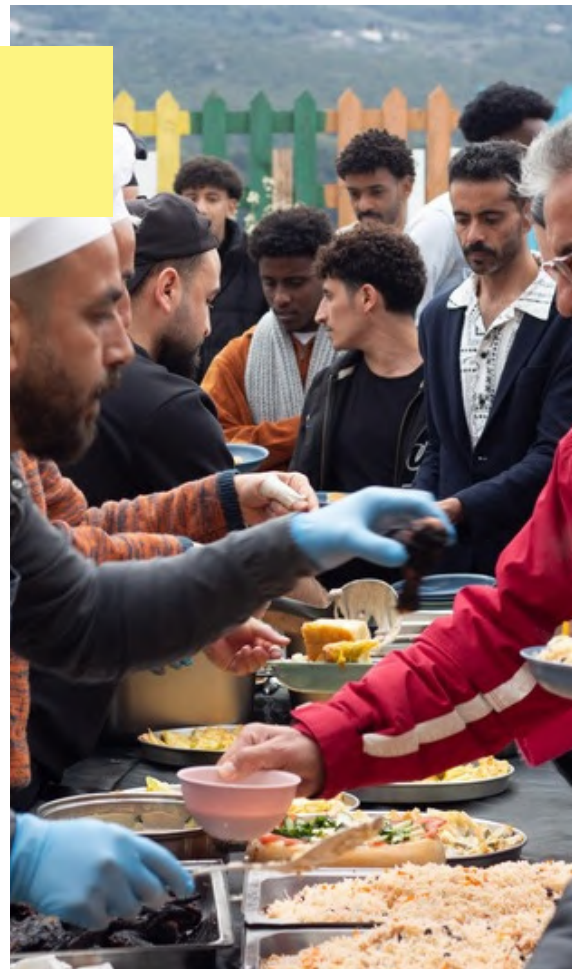


GROWING THROUGH CHANGE

DOORS TO THE FUTURE

IMAGINING BORDERS, FUTURES, AND NEW
WAYS OF CONNECTING



In a wonderful collaboration with the **University of Graz**, represented by **Dr. Carolyn Defrin**, SKILLS FACTORY hosted an arts event that imagined a different, more human way of looking at borders and the future.

What started as a request for a space for a team of artists, including our own **Media Coordinator Ezedin**, grew into a broader collaboration. As the artists prepared their work, our maintenance team built doors to be used as sculptures in the exhibition, while our kitchen team prepared a “menu for the future” and served it throughout the two-day event.

The event brought together people from many backgrounds and nationalities and truly practiced what it preached. As Carolyn shared afterwards:

“So many people contributed to making the project possible, and that spirit of collaboration is what Doors to the Future is really about. The sound pieces created on Samos will continue their journey this autumn, when the project will be presented as part of a festival in Graz, Austria”

It was a wonderful day of sharing skills, work, and space with the wider community, while also raising vital donations to support our ongoing work. Events like our Makers Market continue to remind us that when we come together, skills become connection, strengthening the heart of our community.

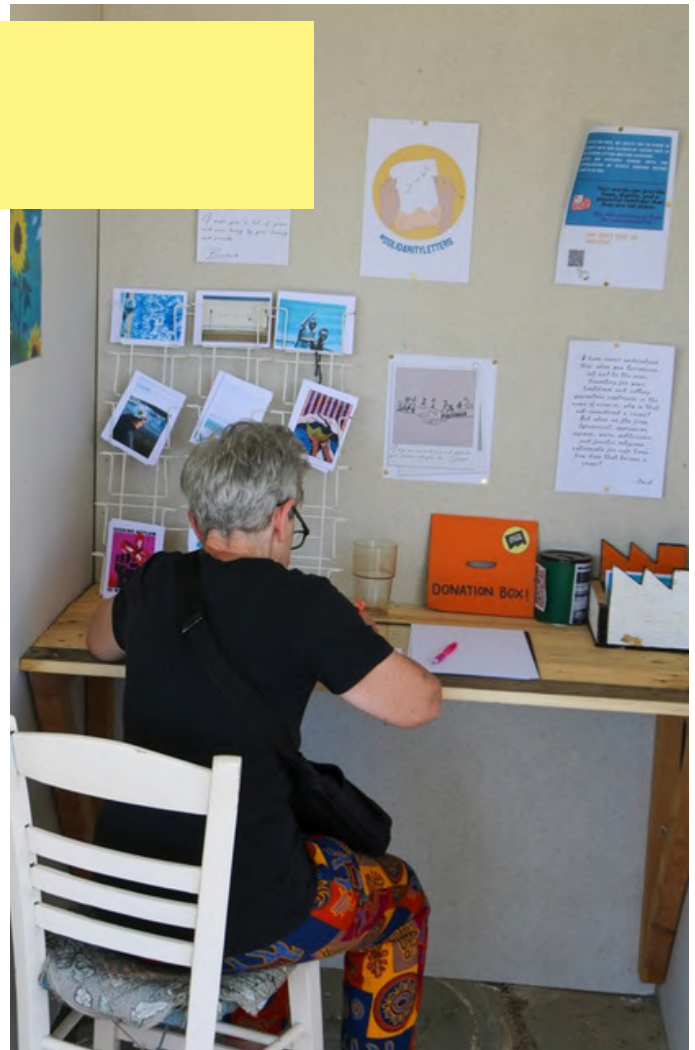
SOLIDARITY DAY

A DAY OF SHARED ACTION AND COMMUNITY

On World Refugee Day, together with Human Rights Legal Project, we gathered in solidarity with **people on the move who seek safety, but face criminalisation instead.**

"Together with selfm.aid we raised funds to support our clients' trial expenses after they were unfairly detained for arriving by boat to seek asylum in Greece. Through a roundtable and an art exhibition, we raised awareness of our work in "boat driver" trials in Samos. It opened important discussions on the need to show that no one should be criminalised, detained, or brought to court for seeking safety."

Throughout the day, people shared knowledge and experiences around ongoing cases of criminalisation, reflected together, and wrote letters of hope to people in prison. Alongside this, an exhibition, a workshop, and collective making created space for connection, resilience, and hope.



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9TH SAMOS MARATHON

OUR RUNNERS

The 9th "Pythagoras the Samian" Half Marathon took place on Sunday, May 3, 2026, bringing together runners from Greece and abroad to celebrate sport, community and the rich cultural heritage of Samos.

SKILLS FACTORY was proudly represented by a strong team of 10 participants, competing in both the 21.1km half marathon and the 4km "fun run". The event provided a fantastic opportunity for our team to come together, challenge ourselves and enjoy an active day outside of our usual routine.

A special congratulations goes to Aladin, who delivered an incredible performance to finish 2nd in the half marathon. This was a huge achievement and a proud moment for the entire team.

For us at SKILLS FACTORY, the event was also a reminder that sport has the power to bring people together. Regardless of where we come from or the circumstances that surround us, we can celebrate everyone's efforts, strengths and achievements.



SKILLS CONNECT

CONNECTING COMMUNITIES

Skills connect is an essential part of Skills Factory to enable people on the move, to become one with the small community of Samos.

By finding employment, aiding with documentation for the right to work, and being the connection between the businesses here in Samos and the new employees, this department gives the opportunity to whoever is interested in working while here on Samos. Skills connect has been successful with finding employment and have had great feedback from the local community.

The more we learn during this process the more we will be able to be hands on, to enable this part of the organisation to bloom in the future into various fields of work.

In addition, reaching out to local businesses, buying local and being present on Samos, as an equal part of the islands community, has proven to have a great positive impact on us and the people we work alongside for years now.

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MAINTENANCE DEPARTMENT

MAKING, BUILDING AND BRINGING IDEAS TO LIFE

The past six months in the Maintenance Department have been full of creativity, new projects and repairs across the SKILLS FACTORY. We recently relocated to a larger space on the other side of the building, helping to minimise noise for our neighbours.

The new space also became the Wood Workshop, where we welcomed our first Craft Workshop facilitators. Recent projects include building tables and benches for Samos Volunteers' classrooms, completing a roof for the outdoor lunch area, developing a new Media Department and podcast room, and helping create a women's hair salon.

We're proud of what we've achieved so far and excited to see what the rest of the year brings!



HAIRDRESSING DEPARTMENT

At the beginning of the year, we opened our Women's Salon after hearing from the community that there was a need for this kind of service.

Since then, we have been slowly building the department and making the salon available to anyone who would like to use it.

We offer services such as hair braiding, washing, and straightening when needed. (Although it is called the Women's Salon, men from the community also sometimes come for braiding.)

The salon is still new, so we don't have many visitors yet. The situation in the camp also means that things can be quiet at times. We don't always have a volunteer available specifically for the salon, so when someone has an appointment, we sometimes ask volunteers from other departments to help.

We are happy to keep the salon open and available to the community, and we hope that with time more people will discover the service and feel comfortable using it.



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WELCOME LUCA

THE RETURN OF OUR BELOVED LUCA IN AN INTERIM COORDINATOR POSITION

We are excited to announce the return of Luca in an **interim coordinator** position. His previous role with us as the WASH and Kitchen Coordinator saw him bring his experience of cooking for hundreds of people on the move in distribution kitchens with his love of cuisines from all around the world, as well as structure and organisation to the WASH Department.

After making a brief return to his homeland of Australia, Luca has returned to SKILLS FACTORY to sit in the Interim Coordinator position. As SKILLS FACTORY undergoes it's transitional period with a new Director and new Co-Project Manager, it is vital that the project has a steady and experienced hand to guide the teams Luca has strong connections with the community, an empathetic approach that ensures deep trust with volunteers and a sense of humour that we treasure.

We are grateful to have him with this for this period and we look forward to seeing him develop his passion for maintenance and more.

My name is Budoor Ali and I am from Sudan. The girl who came to Samos with big dreams and an even bigger appetite to help.

I'm the loud one, the smiley one, the one who can't sit still when someone needs help. Before Samos, I studied and worked in Turkey from 2021 to 2023, where I learned how to talk to people, listen, and stay strong.

In 2026, I joined SKILLS FACTORY and practically lived in the kitchen. I cooked with all the love I had, sang loudly, danced with all my energy, and enjoyed every moment of making a dish - even when things got busy and chaotic. I was lucky to work with an amazing team, who became much more than coworkers - they became family and friends.

At SKILLS FACTORY, I learned how to work as a team when everything is busy and everyone is talking at once. I learned that you can communicate with people even when you don't speak the same language - sometimes a smile is enough. Most importantly, I learned that food is more than food. When someone is stressed or scared, a warm plate can help them feel human again.

Being at SKILLS FACTORY and seeing selfm.aid work closely with the community taught me to look beyond people's immediate needs and see the story behind their eyes. It made me more patient, calmer, and more human.

Today, I am taking a breath and looking for my next step, but my heart is still in that kitchen. My dream is to work with refugees: to cook, care, and connect with people, and help them feel safe, full, and seen.

PWB IN ACTION

REVIEW OF THE PAST 6 MONTHS IN PWB

The first half of 2026 marked an important transition for the project.

Following a period of reduced activity due to financial challenges, including the temporary suspension of UNHCR funding, the project gradually regained momentum. While January and February remained relatively quiet, operations restarted at full capacity in March, with volunteers and students returning and activities progressively resuming.

This period also brought **significant changes to the team**. After years of dedication and invaluable contributions, Mohammed, who led the technical activities, and Julia, who managed administration, both moved on from the project. We are deeply grateful for their commitment and the strong foundations they helped build. In March and April, a new management team was established with Lucile and Omar, bringing fresh energy while ensuring continuity for the project's next chapter.

Another major milestone was our move into a new, **independent workspace**. Having our own repair workshop, has created a quieter and more suitable environment for the precision and concentration required in smartphone repair. This new space also provides greater flexibility for training and day-to-day operations.

As part of this fresh start, we conducted a complete inventory of equipment and materials, reviewed our training programme, and reorganized our operational processes to build a stronger foundation for the future.

TRAINING PROGRAMME

STRENGTHENING THE HANDS ON TRAINING

With a new technical manager, it was the perfect opportunity to review and enhance the training aspect of the project.

Based on student feedback and evolving needs, we introduced a new certification pathway, beginning with a new Level 1 regarding Electronics Fundamentals. Before diving into smartphone repair, students build a solid understanding of electronic components and how devices work. This foundation makes it easier to understand the complex repairs performed inside a smartphone while also providing skills that are transferable to other electronic devices.

The following levels remain focused on smartphone repair, with updated learning objectives to better reflect each stage of progression.

This structure not only strengthens their technical understanding but also allows volunteers who stay for shorter periods to complete a meaningful first level, leaving with valuable knowledge and a rewarding achievement.

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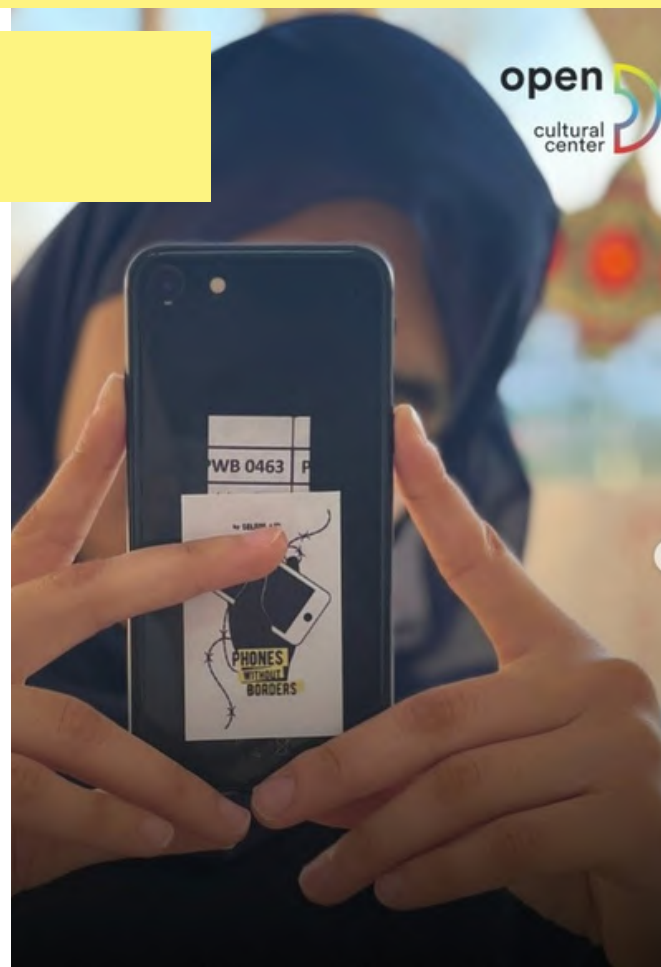
COLLABORATIONS

GROWING THROUGH PARTNERSHIPS

As the project has grown, so has our network of partners. Building on long-standing collaborations, we continued to strengthen our relationships with NGOs across Greece, particularly on Samos, in Athens, and in Northern Greece.

In the first half of 2026 alone, we collaborated with or were **in contact with 17 NGOs**. Many of these organisations regularly reach out whenever they identify people in urgent need of a phone. Increasingly, we are also contacted directly by individuals, highlighting a simple reality: access to a reliable phone remains essential for staying connected, accessing services, and navigating daily life safely.

When partnering with an organisation, we first ensure that its mission and distribution process align with our values. Once established, we provide **boxes of 5 to 10 refurbished smartphones**, depending on availability, trusting our partners to identify those who need them most and enabling them to respond quickly and effectively.

TRAINEE SPOTLIGHT

MEET RAED

Raed comes from Yemen, where he worked as a farmer. Today, he is developing a very different kind of hands-on skill: repairing mobile phones.

Raed first heard about PWB through a group of people talking about a place offering training in phone repair. Curious, he decided to join.

From the beginning, he stood out as a fast learner, always ready to take on a new challenge and never afraid to try something new, or get his hands on a phone and figure things out. His energy and willingness to learn also made him a great presence in the workshop.

Over the weeks, Raed successfully achieved his **Level 2 certification**, a recognition of the skills, effort, and commitment he invested in the workshop.

But what he enjoys most isn't simply learning how a phone works. It's seeing what happens when a repair is successful.

"When a customer comes to you and you fix their device - especially when you hand it back fully repaired and see them happy - I really enjoy seeing the joy on their face."

For Raed, repairing a phone is therefore about more than the device itself. It's about learning a skill that can be used to help someone else.

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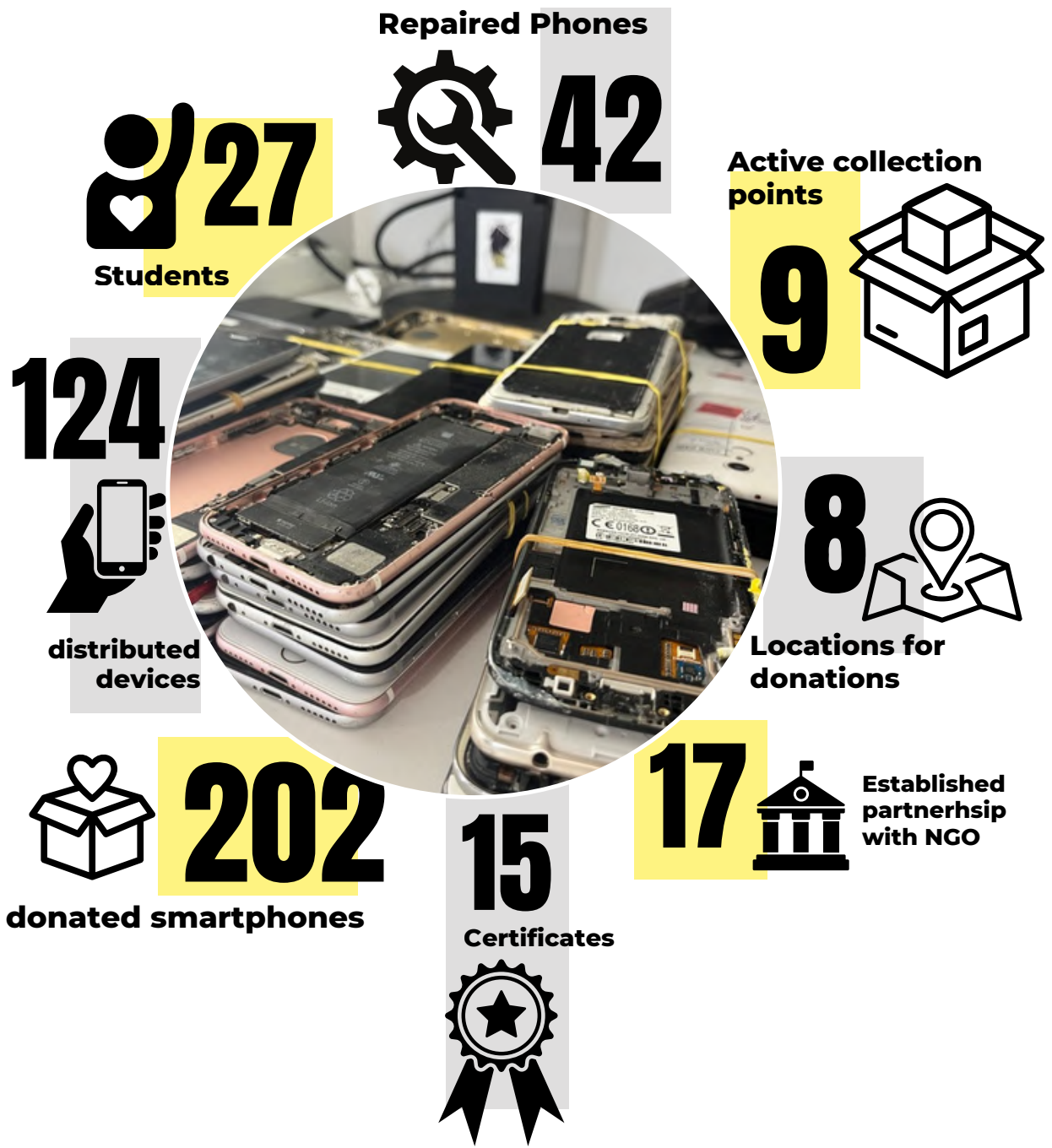

A few words from the people who worked alongside Julia :

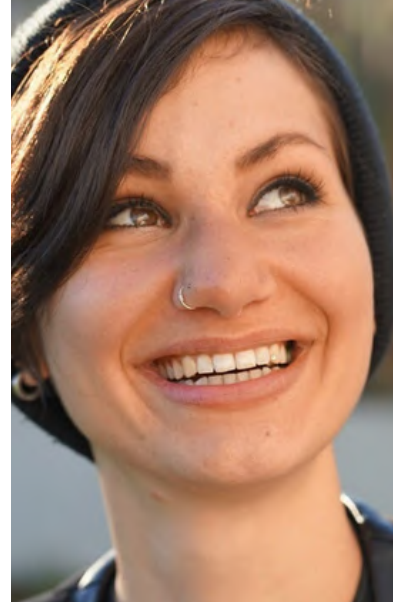
Katharina Scholle, Co-Manager SKILLS FACTORY:
